CONNECTIONS: After he landed at a mid-sized chain, Jean ventured out in the community, forging relationships with doctors. It was something he did on his own time. His bosses didn’t think it was a good idea. This went on for almost 10 years, until Jean finally realized that he wasn’t going anywhere. “You follow along with a smile on your face, but I was going against the grain of the culture.”

LIGHT-BULB MOMENT: “I had some ideas of what pharmacy could be. It was not in the cards for me to work for someone else.” Jean has owned his own pharmacy for 11 years, but it hasn’t always been easy. “I am the poster child for learning the hard way.”
