- In the event of an overdose, naloxone can be administered to block or reverse the effects of opioid medication.
- Be sure to ask your pharmacist for more information on naloxone and access to the medication.

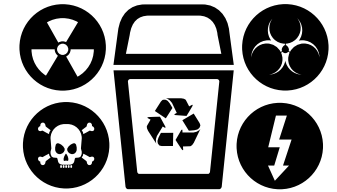
